The Global Ideas Institute (GII) is a cutting-edge program that challenges you to tackle complex global issues that continue to perplex individuals and institutions worldwide. It equips you with the tools, frameworks, and knowledge necessary to craft innovative ideas and reccomendations to multidimensional problems that can be applied in the 'real world.'

2 November 2022 to 21 April 2023

#### **HOW DOES THE PROGRAM WORK?**

- Participating Grade 10 and 12 secondary student teams of 4-6 students tackle a global challenge.
- U of T professors and expert practitioners will present <u>monthly lectures</u> that provide context to the issue.
- Each student team will also have U of T student mentors to guide and help them to develop innovative ideas to address the problem.
- Each lecture is supplemented with a package of articles, current research, and additional videos to provide students with context and knowledge.
- Faculty expertise combined with the support and guidance from U of T mentors will prepare secondary students for a <u>day-long symposium to present their ideas</u> at the Munk School of Global Affairs and Public Policy in Toronto.

# 2022-23 CHALLENGE

The face of education today has changed since the 19th century thanks to concerted global efforts and reforms. The number of children attending primary school has gone up exponentially, covering almost 90% of the world's children today. However, enrollment is no longer the chief challenge in education, and many more issues such as attainment, quality, inclusivity, the gender gap component, crises, etc. remain prevalent in education systems worldwide. While the vast majority of countries around the world have official and organized schooling systems, gaps remain in both the access to and quality of, education within countries and between high-income and low-income states. These gaps have created a multitude of challenges for inclusive and equitable global education beyond just access, further exacerbated by the school closures and education disruptions during the COVID-19 pandemic.



#### **ELIGIBILITY**

- Secondary school students in Grade 10- 12 can participate
- Students must be able to form teams of 4-6 with a teacher champion chosen from the school
- Students must be able to commit time to attend mentor and expert sessions (2 hours/month) in addition to working independently on their projects and attending the final day-long Symposium in April in Toronto

#### **REGISTERATION FEE:**

- Global Ideas Institute charges a fee to cover the cost of running the program
- Student Registration Fee: \$50/student for public schools, \$150/student for independent students.
