Global Ideas Institute 2013-14 ** Call for Volunteer Mentors **

The Global Ideas Institute is a joint venture between the Asian Institute at the Munk School of Global Affairs and University of Toronto Schools (UTS) to provide intensive research and learning opportunities to high school students in the Toronto area. Throughout the year, high school students undertake readings, attend a speaker series, and collaborate with professors and volunteer mentors on a 'real-world problem.'

This year, the GII challenge is focused on child malnutrition in India – where a third of the world's malnourished children live. To address the nutritional and developmental needs of its children, the Government of India launched a federal program called the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS), which included the Supplementary Nutrition Program (SNP) initiative to distribute nutritious meals through *anganwadi* centres (government sponsored child and mother-care centres). The students' challenge is to create a strategy to improve the feasibility, sustainability, and scalability of profitable, locally operated enterprises that supply nutritious food to these *anganwadi* centres across India.

Volunteer mentors will help students understand their assigned readings and will guide students' intellectual development through monthly discussion groups after the GII speaker series. In April 2014, student teams will present their strategy at a final Symposium featuring a panel of experts in the field of health and development.
